

Guidelines for Submitting Practice Work

- At the end of any lesson practice questions will be given. These are designed to get you practicing (hence the clever name) what we have just covered. The purpose of these questions is to make sure any problem areas are identified & to assist the transfer of information from short-term memory to long-term memory (where you want it to be for later quizzes & tests).
- You will submit your practice questions work. To achieve the most success in the course I recommend practice questions be completed and handed within 1 or 2 days of being given. Practice work for a unit will usually not be accepted after the unit test.
- You will assign yourself a score from 1 to 5 on each practice work as per the standards on the back of this page and write that number at the top of the page of work you are submitting along with your name, date, section number, page and question numbers (see example below). You may assign yourself a .5 score if you feel your work is between two of the standards.
- I will look over the work and the score you have assigned to it. I will record that score, or a lower or higher score if I feel you have improperly self-assessed yourself.
- Practice work will be the baseline for determining learning habits. Also, potential test rewrites will only be granted to students with adequate practice work completion (along with other factors)

E (excellent) – 86% to 100%

G (good) - 73% to 85%

S (satisfactory) - 50% to 72%

N (needs improvement) - 35% to 49%

U (Unsatisfactory) – 0% to 34%

NOTE: To achieve a certain score ALL of the conditions in that column must be met. Your weakest part dominates your overall score. For example, if everything is at a 5 level except your work is not always readable then your score is a 2.
